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Introduction

Since its establishment in September 1990, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (hereafter, the Institute or HKIAPS) has been promoting and coordinating interdisciplinary studies on Hong Kong and neighbouring Asian societies within the Asia-Pacific region. The Institute aims to serve as a bridge between overseas scholars in Asia-Pacific studies and teaching and research staff at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (hereafter, the Chinese University or CUHK).

The Institute supports two major types of research activities: individual projects funded by or affiliated with the Institute and long-term interdisciplinary research programmes that constitute the backbone of the activities of the Institute. The latter activities are described at length in the following pages, while the former will be mentioned in particular sections of individual programme reports.

Message from the Director

The Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies has established our reputation as knowledge hub of social science research in Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region. Findings of our ongoing research on social, political and economic development of Hong Kong, Mainland China and the region are disseminated extensively across the intellectual community. We collaborate closely with stakeholders in the public and private sectors to provide scientific and evidencebased inputs to inform policy analyses and decisions. To promote scholarly exchange, the Institute also organizes academic and public events regularly.

We are pleased to bring you our Annual Report for the last year with news, events, research projects held by our Research Centres and Programmes during the reporting period. In this issue, you will see that we held 7 international conferences, and 57 other events including forums, seminars, public lectures, workshops and trainings, addressing diverse issues such as capacity building programs for non-profit organisations, climate change and cities, Sino-American relations, gender and migration, new developments in the Arab world, Liberal Studies seminars for secondary school teachers, as well as housing development and institutional reform in China. The Publication Unit, another core service function of the Institute, has published one monograph and two occasional papers last year in addition to the academic publications of the individual researchers.



In the past year, The Chinese University Hong Kong celebrated its 50th anniversary. The Institute held two international conferences commemorate occasion. The first was the Inter-University Seminar on Asian Megacities: Asian Urbanism Beyond, and chaired by Prof. Mee-kam, our Associate

Director. It was organized by Urban Studies Programme, Faculty of Social Science. We were one of the coorganizers of the event. The three-day event held on 15 - 17 August 2014 attracted renowned speakers from around the world. It aimed to explore the nature, evolution and uniqueness of urbanization issues and processes in Asian mega-cities, especially surrounding the relevancy of theories developed in Western contexts in describing, explaining and prescribing urban phenomena in the diverse social, economic and political Asian contexts.

The other 50th anniversary celebratory conference was the International Conference on Gender and Migration: Changes and Challenges, organized by the Gender Research Centre and Gender Studies Programme. We engaged Women's Studies Centre at Peking University and Institute of Women's **Studies** Keimyung



University as our co-organizers with support from the our Faculty of Social Science, Chung Chi College, and New Asia College. The conference explored various topical issues, including theories and methods on gender and migration, cross-border marriages and families, migration law, policies and citizenship.

In order to strengthen research collaboration with counterparts in Mainland China, we have signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Sun Yat-Sen University on establishing Cooperative Innovation Center for Partnership Development among Hong Kong, Macau and Mainland China between SYSU and the CUHK. The collaboration was part of the initiative initiated by the State Ministry of Education aiming to leverage the strengths of different institutions in specific frontier scientific and innovative areas. Regular meetings were held and the Cooperative Innovation Center is now formally named as "Collaborative Innovation Center for the Cooperation and Development of Hong Kong, Macao, and Mainland China".

The Telephone Survey Research Laboratory, which conducts surveys on behalf of our university colleagues and public opinion polls for the local community, had completed 50 telephone surveys during the reporting period. The survey results were released regularly to raise public awareness on social issues and to facilitate public deliberations.

For strategic planning, we have reviewed the research landscape within the Chinese University as well as in Hong Kong, Mainland China and the Asia-Pacific region since the establishment of the Institute twenty years ago. We have consolidated our strategic position and directions to achieve our mission and objectives. In addition to advancing academic research, the Institute considers policy research an integral function whereby we contribute to evidence-based policy formulation and deliberations. The Institute provides a platform to facilitate our colleagues' engagement in policy research and knowledge transfer.

The Institute has established the Population Policy Research Programme under the Public Policy Research Centre in response to the HKSAR Government's population policy initiatives in 2013 and to push for university-wide concerted efforts to deepen our understanding on population policy in Hong Kong. There are three main research themes under the Programme, namely (i) demography, migration and social integration, (ii) human resource development, and (iii) sustainable development and urban fabric.

Furthermore, the Institute will promote cross disciplinary research so as to serve continually as the hub for basic and applied social sciences research. It is our vision to expand to a wider scope such that our work could further promote the third mission of CUHK on knowledge transfer.

While we will be celebrating the 25th Anniversary next year, the Institute, through its Research Centres and Programmes, will continue to strengthen its collaboration with renowned academia in Greater China and regional partners in other parts of Asia. We will host three conferences including "Conference on Regional Environmental Initiatives in East Asia and their Impact on Regionalism" (March 2015), "International Conference on Youth Studies and Public Policy" (May 2015) as well as "Rethinking Education, Embracing Diversity" (June 2015).

The contributions of the Research Centres and Programmes to the Institute's collective accomplishment in the past year are described in the ensuing individual reports. Here, we would like to express our sincere gratitude and appreciation to the Management Committee and all our colleagues in the Institute. Their passion, commitment, professionalism and excellent teamwork are most invaluable to the development of the Institute. We are particularly grateful for our four Associate Directors, Professors Anthony Y. H. Fung, NG Mee-kam, Sung Yun-wing, and Timothy K. Y. Wong.

We wish to take this opportunity to recognize all our current and former colleagues for their contributions to our accomplishments in the past year. With our sustained and concerted efforts, we have every confidence that the Institute will build on our strength to make even greater strides in promoting evidence-based knowledge to serve the society.

PROFILES OF THE SENIOR STAFF

CHAN Kin-man (陳健民)

PhD (Sociology), Yale University

Associate Professor, Department of Sociology, CUHK Director, Centre for Civil Society Studies, HKIAPS

Professor Chan's research interests include democracy, civil society and governance, social movement, corruption and political trust. He serves in the editorial boards of Journal of Civil Society, China Non-Profit Review (Beijing) and Third Sector Review (Taiwan), and is academic advisor of China Charity and Donation Information Center under the Ministry of Civil Affairs in China. He is the Chair of Adjudication Committee (2009, 2010) of the Philanthropy Awards of the Jet Li One Foundation, and Strategic Advisor of the Guangdong Harmonious Foundation. In Hong Kong, his previous community engagements include member of Community Research Committee of the Independent Commission Against Corruption, part-time member of Central Policy Unit, founding member of Hong Kong Democratic Development Network, member of Chief Executive Election Committee (higher education subsector), and he is currently Director of Hong Kong Civil Education Foundation and Advisor to the Hong Kong Social Enterprise Incubation Centre. He has published in Journal of Civil Society, Communist and Post-Communist Studies, Sociological Research (Beijing), and other academic journals. He is the co-author of several books including Stories and Theories of Democracy (with Choy Chi Keung), Contentious Views: Nine Debates that Changed Hong Kong (with Ng Shu Yui), One Country Two Systems (with Tsui Sing Yan), Trade Association and Social Capital (with Qiu Haixiong), and he is the sole author of Towards Civil Society and Civil Society Perspective: Towards Good Governance. Professor Chan is also Associate Director of the Center for Entrepreneurship at CUHK.

CHEUNG Mui-ching, Fanny (張妙清)

PhD (Psychology), University of Minnesota

Pro-Vice-Chancellor / Vice-President Choh-Ming Li Professor of Psychology Director, Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies Co-Director, Centre for Social and Political Development **Studies**

Professor Cheung was formerly Dean of the Faculty of Social Science and Chairperson of the Department of Psychology. An active advocate for promoting women's status through scientific research. She established the Gender Research Centre in 1985 and served as the Director until 2010, and initiated the Gender Studies Programme at CUHK. Her work has led to increased awareness of gender issues in the academia and the community.

Professor Cheung obtained her bachelor's degree in

Psychology from the University of California, Berkeley, and PhD in Psychology from the University of Minnesota. Her research expertise lies in cross-cultural personality assessment and psychopathology, gender equality, and women leadership. Professor Cheung is currently President of the International Test Commission, a Fellow and former President of the Hong Kong Psychological Society, and a Fellow of the American Psychological Association (APA) as well as the Association for Psychological Science (APS).

Professor Cheung is dedicated to public service and has served on many government committees and advisory bodies. From 1996 to 1999, She served as the Founding Chairperson of the Hong Kong Equal Opportunities Commission, setting up the mechanism to eliminate discrimination and promote equal opportunities for women and men, and for people with disabilities. Currently she is serving in the Electoral Affairs Commission, and the Advisory Group on Eliminating Discrimination against Sexual Minorities. She was invited as a special representative for the 7th-10th National Congress of Chinese Women. In honour of her contributions to the community, she was appointed Justice of Peace in 1988 and a Hong Kong Affairs Advisor in 1995-97. She was made an Officer of The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (OBE) in 1997.

Professor Cheung's research covers cross-cultural personality assessment, clinical and community psychology, women's leadership, and gender equality. She has published and lectured widely internationally. Her academic publications total over 180 international refereed journal articles, book chapters, books and monographs. Her academic honours and awards include the APA Award for Distinguished Contributions to the International Advancement of Psychology 2012, Distinguished International Psychologist Award of APA Division 52 (2005), and Distinguished Leadership Award for Internationals from the University of Minnesota (2003).

Professor Cheung's research focuses on sociology of deviance, youth problem, drug abuse, gambling, and evaluation research. Her publications appear in Social Science & Medicine, Journal of Gambling Studies, Youth & Society, Sociological Perspectives, Journal of Youth & Adolescence, and Substance Use & Misuse. She is also currently an appointed member of government advisory bodies of HKSAR including Commission on Youth, Home Affairs Bureau (2009-present), Treatment and Rehabilitation Subcommittee, Action Committee Against Narcotics, Narcotics Bureau (2009-present), and Advisory Committee on Admission of Quality Migrants and Professionals, Department of Immigration (2010-present).

Professor Chiu's research interests include development studies, industrial relations, social movements, and the comparative study of East Asian societies. He has published widely in international journals and has also written three co-authored books: East Asia and the World Economy (1995, Newbury Park: Sage), City-States in the Global Economy: The Industrial Restructuring of Hong Kong and Singapore (1997, Boulder: Westview), and Hong Kong: Becoming a Chinese Global City (1997, London: Routledge). Active in the Liberal Studies community in the secondary school sector, he has been the coordinator of the Support Programme on the Teaching and Learning of Liberal Studies, Sociology Department, CUHK since its inception in 1997 and is also the Chair of the CDC-HKEAA Committee on Liberal Studies (Senior Secondary). He also served as the Part-time Member of the Central Policy Unit, and was a member of the Strategic Development Commission of the HKSAR Government.

CHOI Yuk-ping, Susanne (蔡玉萍)

Professor Choi is also the first director (until 31st July 2013) of the Pearl River Delta Social Research Centre under the Department of Sociology at CUHK. Her research interests include gender, health, migration, family and transitional justice. Her research papers were published in various international journals, including American Journal of Sociology, Sociology of Health and Illness, The China Quarterly, Political Psychology, Social Science and Medicine, AIDS Care, Journal of Conflict Resolution, International Migration Review, Human Rights Quarterly, Sexually Transmitted Diseases, Journal of Interpersonal Violence, Culture, Health and Sexuality, and American Journal of Gastroenterology. Her current projects examine the impact of migration on family lives and gender equalities in intimate relationships.

Professor Chong's main research areas include Econometrics and Finance. He has published over 300 Chinese and English articles covering a wide spectrum of topics in Econometrics, Finance, Mathematics, Psychology, Education, and the Hong Kong Economy. He ranks top 37th worldwide in theoretical econometrics and top 2% authors worldwide according to the number of distinct works and number of journal pages per author. His papers appear in reputable international journals, including Journal of Econometrics, Econometric Theory, Econometric Review, Econometrics Journal, Journal of Time Series Analysis, Journal of Banking and Finance, Financial Management, Quantitative Finance, Financial Review, Pacific-Basin Finance Journal, Journal of Economic Psychology, Southern Economic Journal, Economics Letters and China Economic Review. Some of his papers are lead articles or the most downloaded papers of the journals. Prof. Chong has been a Part-time member of the Central Policy Unit of the HKSAR Government. He is currently a member of Standard Working Hours Committee and Transport Advisory Committee of the HKSAR Government, the associate editor of Singapore Economic Review and Economics Bulletin, the Associate Dean of Students of New Asia College, a member of the Board of Governors of Hong Lok Yuen International School.



Objectives

The Centre aims to be a cross-disciplinary and cross-regional academic organization with a focus on studying families of Chinese descent. Our members conduct research not only among families who originally reside in Chinese societies (i.e., Mainland China, Hong Kong, Macau and Taiwan), but also among families who migrate between the Chinese societies (e.g., from Mainland China to Hong Kong) or from Chinese to non-Chinese societies (e.g. to the United States). We take diverse perspectives and approaches to understand families of Chinese descent (e.g., we scrutinize indigenous Chinese notions such as filial piety, compare Chinese families with Western families, examine marriage, parenthood and grandparenthood, address health and mental health issues in the family, or analyze social determinants of family formation and changes). Our goal is to establish a platform for promoting empirical investigations and intellectual exchanges among scholars concerned about the wellbeing of families of Chinese descent, and also for disseminating the scientific knowledge to the general public.

Background

The Centre for Civil Society Studies (CCSS) was established in 2008 under the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies at CUHK.

Objectives

The mission of the Centre is to enhance the development of civil society in Chinese societies through research and education. The Centre has the following objectives:

- 1. To provide database support for academic and consultancy research on civil society in Chinese societies, including mainland China, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Macau;
- 2. To promote public awareness and disseminate advanced knowledge of civil society through educational programs and other academic activities:
- 3. To facilitate cooperation across sectors by building a network of academic institutes, governments, businesses and NGOs in the region; and
- 4. To enhance innovation in public policy making by promoting the importance of civil society in good governance.

Research-related Activities

A. Social Impact Assessment in Hong Kong and China

Since its inception, a core research focus of CCSS is to assist philanthropic intermediaries and non-profit organizations to conduct social impact assessment of their program activities. In the past year, in an attempt to broaden its skill sets on impact evaluation, the Centre worked in partnership with the Hong Kong Institute of Social Impact Analysts (HKI-SIA) to conduct impact evaluation projects for both social enterprises and traditional charities using the SROI framework (SROI

stands for Social Return on Investment). As a local affiliate of The SROI Network International, HKI-SIA has been actively promoting the use of SROI in Hong Kong, while CCSS offered technical advice and research support to some of the SROI projects.

B. Social Enterprise Sector Landscape Study

During 2013/14, CCSS continued to serve as Research Consultant to the research consortium to conduct the Social Enterprise Sector Landscape Study commissioned by the Home Affairs Bureau of the Hong Kong Government. With the CUHK Center for Entrepreneurship serving as the lead research institution, and CCSS and the Social Enterprise Business Centre (SEBC) at the Hong Kong Council of Social Services as the other two participating research units, the landscape study was concluded and the full research report submitted to the Home Affairs Bureau around June 2014. The full research report, consolidating the findings of four main components including social enterprise survey, public opinion poll, social enterprise case studies, and the running of practitioner focus groups, will be released around late October 2014, just before the annual Hong Kong Social Enterprise Summit.

C. Researching the Sharing Economy in Hong Kong

Besides joining the research team in implementing the Social Enterprise Sector Landscape Study, CCSS also initiated a new line of research in reviewing and mapping the development of collaborative consumption and the sharing economy in Hong Kong, and the two-volume publication "Sharing Cities" and "Sharing Hong Kong" was released in April, along with the organization of Hong Kong's first ever "ShareFest" at the Hong Kong Polytechnic University (co-organized by CCSS and the PolyU Centre for Social Policy Study). In examining how the spirit and practice of social entrepreneurship were manifested in the local sharing economy cases, this new line of research complements and further enriches the study of social entrepreneurship in Hong Kong.

D. Seminars

During the 2013/14 academic year, the Centre organized 6 seminars and civil society salons (with some of the events co-organized with other academic units). The seminars covered a wild range of topics from NGO management practices, program evaluation to civil society theories. The events were well received by students, peer researchers and NGO practitioners.

Education and Professional Development Activities

A. Training and Capacity Building Programs for NPOs

In support of the development of the nonprofit sector in China, the Centre continued to organize tailor-made training and capacity building programs that addressed the specific needs of NPO practitioners from various service fields and with very diverse backgrounds. In the previous year, the Centre designed and launched four separate programs that served more than 80 participants, with themes such as self-regulation, nonprofit accountability and transparency, and grassroots community development. Typical program activities include lectures, workshops and seminars, visits to local NPOs and social enterprises, and community site visits.

B. Forum on Community Development

Community development and grassroots organizing has been a key concern to many NPO practitioners and the topic was frequently examined in NPO training courses. As a response to the demand for knowledge dissemination, the Centre organized a half-day forum in December with an objective to share local experience and stimulate innovations in community building. In the forum, seasoned practitioners and experts from Hong Kong, Taiwan and Mainland China gathered to compare historical developments and deliberate on emerging new challenges under different societal contexts. The forum attracted over 40 participants including scholars, students, practitioners, and the general public.

Other Exchange and Student Activities

With an aim to enhance social awareness and promote civic and social engagement, CCSS continued to work in partnership with the University's I-CARE Program in organizing a wide range of thematic activities that served CUHK students.

A. I-CARE NGO internship in Greater China

To promote the all-round development of CUHK students through cultural exchange and civic engagement, the Centre -- with the participation of the student association Youth Civil Society and with the support of the CUHK Global Internship Programme -- organized the highly popular eight-week NPO summer internship during June to

August. This year, the total number of NPOs participated in the internship program increased to ten, and 31 students were selected from over 230 applicants to serve as interns in the NPOs while also living together with the local communities:

B. I-CARE Lecture on Civility

This year, the University I-CARE Lecture on Civility invited two renowned scholars from Mainland China to deliver two lectures addressing the important topics on rule of law and democracy. Prof He Weifang from Peking University presented "The road of constitutionalism in China" in October, while Prof Liu Yu of Tsinghua University presented the topic "Two concepts on democracy" in January. Both lectures attracted large crowds of audiences.

Cultural activities were also organized to inspire creativity and stimulate intellectual development. With alumni generously donating used books, the Homecoming Book Festival served as a unique occasion to facilitate the exchange of second-hand books and promote a reading culture on campus. Compared to last year, the book fair drew even more attention with an increase in overall participants. In total, over 130 alumni donated 22,500 books and some five thousand students collected the second-hand books during the two-week period. Poet Beidao and lyricist Linxi had been invited to share their views and sentiments about writing and reading.

Also, the first ever I-CARE Film Festival was also launched in springtime. Believing in the power of cinema to inspire the mind and nourish the heart, a total of 27 local and international films of different genres were screened around various campus locations during the three-week festival. Distinguished guests were invited to host post-screening talks to share their passions and inspirations. Other highlights of the Festival include the 35mm film screening at Sir Run Run Hall, outdoor screenings at New Asia College and Wu Yee Sun College, and the marathon overnight screening which was attended by passionate students. In all, there were over 5000 participants in all of the events and activities.

Background and Objectives

Under the guidance and support of the Science and Technology Committee (STC) of the Ministry of Housing and Urban Rural Development (MOHURD), PRC, the Center for Housing Innovations (CHI) was established in 1998 at the 301 Conference Room of the Ministry in Beijing under the supports from the leadership of The Chinese University of Hong Kong. The management and development of CHI are advised by the Ministry senior leadership, and are operating on a self-financed basis. Long Before her establishment in 1998, CHI has started her researches since 1993. CHI has assisted the nation in conducting various prominent research projects, for example, the SARS research, housing privatization studies, Green Building Label development, etc. CHI engaged not only in research, but also in connecting professionals to support the developments of mainland China, Hong Kong and Taiwan. - 2. Health of the urban environment;
- 3. Energy efficiency and thermal comfort;

- 4. Building construction efficiency and quality;
- 5. Dissemination of information on housing for high density habitation.





And in the project design, students from different schools will cooperate with each other to complete the site planning and design with concepts and models.

The Center aims at promoting scholarly research on issues of quality of life in the world in general and Hong Kong in particular through cross-disciplinary research, academic exchange activities, and cross-institutional collaboration. Besides, the Centre is committed to social service development, policy formulations and promotion of the quality of life of people in Hong Kong.

Research Activities

CUHK Hong Kong Quality of Life Index

During the years, the Centre continued with the longitudinal study of CUHK Hong Kong Quality of Life Index (QoL Index). Incorporating the effort and expertise of scholars form different disciplines, the Faculty of Social Science has compiled the QoL Index since 2002. Starting from 2003, the Index is updated and released annually.

The QoL Index is developed to address the following objectives:

- To measure and monitor the quality of life in Hong Kong in the 21st century;
- To engage relevant parties in promoting the quality of life in Hong Kong;
- 3. To provide policy-makers and the community with useful statistics on the quality of life in Hong Kong; and
- 4. To advocate the quality of life in Hong Kong and draw public attention to the issue of quality of life.

The QoL Index is a composite index. It consists of 21 indicators that are grouped into three sub-groups, including Social, Economic and Environmental sub- indices. Among the 21 indicators, six are compiled by the Centre, include the

aspects of stress, general life satisfaction, press freedom, press criticism, government performance, and current economic conditions. The other idiocies are obtained from the government and related institutions.

In addition, the Centre also provides Consumer Confidence, Consumer Sentiment, and Employment Confidence Indices that are surveyed and compiled quarterly. The results are requested by organizations and institutes such as Bloomberg and Thomson Reuters on a continuous basis.

MTR-CUHK Youth QoL Index

Parallel to the CUHK QoL Index, the Centre also released the MTR-CUHK Youth QoL Index 2013/14 this year. Financially supported by the MTR Corporation, the research project was firstly launched in 2012 and will be continued for at least 5 years. The Index examines and monitors eight life domains of youth in Hong Kong, including physical health, psychological well-being, society, economics, education, politics, living environment and overall well-being.

Objectives

The aims of the Centre are to explore and summarize experiences and lessons from the practice of "one country, two systems"; to generate scientific and applied theories and to formulate relevant policies for the reference of stakeholders from different sectors of society; and to stimulate research on local social and political transformations. Its concrete objectives include:

- ◆ To analyze the structure and special nature of social classes and political groups in Hong Kong;
- To promote high-quality research on local society, politics, and related policies;
- To unearth and develop think-tank talent through related research;
- To provide a platform for rational and evidence-based discussions on local social and political developments; and
- To disseminate our research findings to interested associations and individuals for reference.

The Social Indicators and Social Development of Hong Kong Programme, with Ms. Po-san WAN as the Director, is operated under the auspices of the Centre. The focus of the Programme is on measuring and studying social developments in Hong Kong. Its prime purpose is to build up a comprehensive system of social indicators for Hong Kong, i.e., a set of longitudinal data on the subjective and objective dimensions of local social conditions and social changes.

Research Activities

The highlights of the main activities undertaken during the past year are given below:

1. "A Comparative Study of Mainland China's Impact on Hong Kong and Taiwan"

This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Institute of Sociology of the Academia Sinica. It aims to understand and compare the perceptions, assessments, and orientations of the general public in Hong Kong and Taiwan with respect to the impact of China, and the opportunities and risks of closer integration between Hong Kong/Taiwan and mainland China. Major research topics include competition and conflict over resources (e.g., unfairness, relative deprivation, economic nationalism, etc.), and the advantages and disadvantages of exchanges and integration (e.g., impact on the quality of life, social differentiation, the gap between rich and poor, civil society, etc.). The first telephone survey was conducted simultaneously in Hong Kong and Taiwan in April 2013. A total of eight papers were presented at the 2013 Annual Conference of the Taiwanese Sociological Association in Taipei.

2. "A Comparative Study of the Social Image of Taiwan and Hong Kong"

This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Institute of Sociology of the Academia Sinica. A telephone opinion survey is conducted simultaneously in Hong Kong and Taiwan once or twice a year using a common questionnaire to gauge the perceptions, values, and subjective well-being of the people of both societies. The core questions of the questionnaire are kept unchanged as far as possible to facilitate the detection of social trends and changes, while questions on special topics are flexible enough to reflect changes in social conditions. The fifteenth survey, which focused on subjective wellbeing, sociopolitical trust, and social problems, was carried out in December 2013. The sixth conference on the social image of Taiwan and Hong Kong was held on 12-13 April 2013 at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK). A total of 13 presentations were made at the conference. A book entitled Near Neighbours: Issues in Taiwan and Hong Kong Societies was published in 2014.

3. "A Study on Hong Kong Families"

coordinated by Prof. Stephen W. K. Chiu, Prof. Kwok-fai Ting, and Ms. Po-san Wan

This project was commissioned by the Central Policy Unit of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region and is being conducted in collaboration with the Centre for Chinese Family Studies and the Public Policy Research Centre. The aims of this project are to provide a detailed analysis of the data collected by the Thematic Household Survey on Hong Kong Families that was completed by the Census and Statistics Department and the Central Policy Unit in 2009; to propose evidence-based policy suggestions on strengthening family relations and functions, and to draw public attention to and facilitate policy discussions on issues relating to local families. Apart from the three coordinators, the following people also contributed to the edited volume arising from this project: Dr. Chungyan Ip (CUHK), Mr. Ka-man Lee (CUHK), Prof. Joyce L. C. Ma (CUHK), Dr. Vienne H. Y. Tso (CUHK), Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng (CUHK), Prof. Annie H. N. Chan (Lingnan University), and Prof. Kenneth W. K. Law (Lingnan University). The final report was submitted and a book is expected to be published by the Central Policy Unit in 2015.

"ChineseFamilyBusinesses:ContinuityandSustainability"

by Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng and Prof. Siu-lun Wong

The aim of this project is to study three generations of Shanghai cotton-spinners in Hong Kong to better understand the issue of business continuity and sustainability. A multidisciplinary approach is being employed to decipher the relationships among entrepreneurship, succession, and transnationalization, with special attention being paid to the issue of continuity and sustainability. The findings are expected to stimulate discussion and facilitate understanding of the following issues: (1) How the Shanghai cottonspinners perceive business challenges and the measures that they have taken to handle such challenges; (2) How they have mobilized different institutional set-ups to ensure business dynamism, control, and sustainability; (3) The ways in which intergenerational succession affects leadership, corporate governance, integrated family/business developmental strategies in a global economic hub like Hong Kong. A book entitled Women's Fighting was published in 2014.

"Chinese Family Businesses: Crisis Operation"

by Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng and Prof. Siu-lun Wong

The aim of this project is to examine how Chinese family businesses face and deal with crises in their management. Continuing previous public lectures on "Chinese family businesses and women" (December 2012), a new series of lectures on the topic of "crisis" will be held in

the Hong Kong Museum of History in November and December 2014. After this series of public lectures, an edited book of the proceedings will be published.

"Chinese Family Businesses and the Stock Market: A Haiwangang Collaborative and Comparative Study" by Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng and Prof. Siu-lun Wong

The aim of this project is to examine the development of family businesses and stock markets in three locations in Greater China: Shanghai, Taiwan, and Hong Kong. Of particular interest are the effects of public listings on the transformation of family businesses and the growth of economies through opening markets to private enterprises. In this study, the larger topic of the rise of Chinese capitalism will be considered. A further goal of the project is to explore the formation of a collaborative financial network among the three stock markets to further enhance competitiveness on the global economic stage. This project was funded by the Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation for International Scholarly Exchange. The final report was submitted in 2013.

"Chinese **Family Businesses** and Women" The aim of this project is to examine the roles that women play in the family and in family businesses. A series of public lectures on "Chinese family businesses and women" were held on 15 December in 2012, in collaboration with the Hong Kong Museum of History and the Hong Kong Institute for the Humanities and Social Sciences. A book entitled Family Businesses and Women was published in 2013.

"Public Attitudes towards the 2012 Chief Executive Election"

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms. Po-san Wan, and Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng

The 2007 decision of the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress that the Chief Executive may be elected by universal suffrage in 2017 represents a critical stage of constitutional development. Although the electoral method has yet to be determined, this decision has elevated the importance of the 2012 election in the eyes of both politicians and the general public. The aim of this project is to identify the public's policy expectations of the fourth Chief Executive, the voting criteria, and the level of support for potential candidates. Seven territorywide telephone opinion surveys were conducted from April 2011 to March 2012. Based on the survey data, 16 newspaper articles, one book chapter, one conference paper (presented at the conference on "Election Systems and Democratic Governance in Hong Kong and Macao" held at the Ming Chuan University on 18 June 2012 in Taipei), and a book entitled Chief Executive Election: Opinion Polls and Analysis were published.

"Public Attitudes towards the 'Occupy Central' Movement"

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms. Po-san Wan, and Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng

The aim of this survey is to investigate public perceptions of protest activities and the "Occupy Central" movement in Hong Kong. A territory-wide telephone survey was conducted in May 2013 to study the perceived "radicalness" and effectiveness of different modes of conflict, the positive and negative effects of the movement, and the propensity to join the movement. Six newspaper articles were published.

10. "Public Opinions towards the Political Reform of 2017"

by Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng, Ms. Po-san Wan, and Dr. Kevin T. W. Wong

The aim of this project is to determine the public's opinions on a few major suggestions on electoral systems for political reform in 2017 and their expectations on the development of democracy in Hong Kong. A telephone survey was conducted from 31 October to 7 November 2013. Six newspaper articles drawing on this survey data were published. In the following years (2015-2017), opinion surveys will continue to be conducted and newspaper articles will also be written to engage the public. Afterwards, a book examining public views on the 2017 political reform will be prepared and published.

11. "Public Opinions towards the Population Policy in Macao 2014"

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng, and Ms. Po-san Wan

With the growth and ageing of the population, a lower fertility rate, and the importation of more non-local labour to Macao, the city faces new challenges. In order to obtain an overall understanding of public attitudes towards the above issues, a telephone survey was conducted in May 2014. A book comparing the population policies of Hong Kong and Macao is expected to be published in 2015.

12. "Survey on Social and Political Trust in Hong Kong 2013"

by Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng, Ms. Po-san Wan, and Dr. Kevin T. W. Wong

The aim of this project is to measure the scope and

extent of significant aspects of social and political trust in Hong Kong, and to identify how these relate to various important sociopolitical attitudes. A telephone survey was conducted from 31 October to 7 November 2013. Based on the survey data, a book will be published in 2015.

13. "The Individual Visit Scheme and the Course of Integration in Greater China"

by Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng and Ms. Po-san Wan

The aim of this project is to explore the course and evolution of the integration between Hong Kong/Macao/ Taiwan and mainland China, especially since the start of the Individual Visit Scheme (IVS) policy. Since the 1980s, we have tracked the topic through social indicator household surveys. Following the return of Hong Kong and Macao to Chinese sovereignty, the integration of these societies into a greater China has taken on a new aspect. Therefore, a new a series of telephone surveys were conducted in Hong Kong, Macao, and Taiwan (refer to the first project in this report) from 2012. To date, a total of one occasional paper, one book chapter, three conference papers, one magazine article, and nine newspaper articles on the subject, drawing on the data from these surveys, have been published, and two public lectures have been delivered. A book comparing the implementation of the IVS policy in Hong Kong and Macao is expected to be published in 2015.

14. "The Seventh Phase of the Study on the Quality of Life in Macao 2011"

This project was commissioned by the Macao Foundation. The members of the Hong Kong team include Prof. Fanny M. Cheung (team leader), Prof. Siu-lun Wong (team leader), Ms. Po-san Wan (coordinator), Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng (coordinator), Prof. Kenneth W. K. Law (Lingnan University), Prof. Ka-ho Mok (Hong Kong Institute of Education), and Prof. Chack-kie Wong. A telephone opinion survey on the quality of life was conducted. Policy briefs were prepared on industrial diversification, regional collaboration, democratic development and governance, civic associations and civil society, education, and social security. In-depth interviews and closed-door policy forums focusing on the above topics were held with socioeconomic and political leaders, government officials, and academics. The final report was submitted in 2012. A book entitled Constructing the Future of Macao was published in 2014.

15. "Voting Behaviour in the 2011 District Council Election"

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms. Po-san Wan, and Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng

The fourth District Council ordinary election was held on 6 November 2011. Starting from the 2012 Legislative Council election, the candidates for the new District Council (Second) Functional Constituency (DCFC) election have been limited to elected District Council members nominated by elected District Council members. The 2011 District Council election was thus regarded as a new battlefield for Legislative Council seats. A total of three territory-wide telephone opinion surveys were conducted before and after the election to study the pattern of voting and non-voting behaviour, the different orientations among the electorate in their choice of candidates, and the impact of the DCFC election method on voting behaviour. Nine newspaper articles were published and a book is expected to be published in 2014.

16. "Voting Behaviour in the 2012 Legislative Council Election"

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms. Po-san Wan, and Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng

The fifth Legislative Council election of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region was held on 9 September 2012. In accordance with the 2007 decision of the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress, the half-and-half ratio between members returned by functional constituencies and geographical constituencies remained unchanged for the 2012 Legislative Council elections. However, the new DCFC election method was implemented to return five additional seats. The DCFC candidates were elected by all registered voters except those already entitled to vote in other functional constituencies. Based on a consideration of the specific political-institutional context within which the election was held, a total of four territory-wide telephone opinion surveys on political orientations and voting behaviour were conducted before and after the election. Seventeen newspaper articles were published and a book is expected to be published in 2014.

Objectives

The Programme was established in summer 2014 with eight core members. In this year, we mainly aimed to start out with planning seminar and conference in 2015, along with the goal of lining up with Utrecht University researchers for research.

We are now organizing a local workshop in Winter 2015 involving people working in the media industry (new media) and social worker to explore and discuss the youth's use of social media. Donna Chu and Steven Ngai are coordinating this event. It will be in the form of a dialogue about the future and status of youth in Hong Kong.

We are now in the process of applying funding from the Faculty of Social Science for an international conference on Youth and Public Policy in May 2015. It will also be an anniversary event for the HKIAPS. Wilson Wong, Stephen Chiu and Anthony Fung are organizers of the conference. Professors from Utrecht University will also be invited as keynote for the conference.

As an active strategy to work with Utrecht University, we also planned to have more visit and meetings with their researchers. 

Objectives

Economic competition and cooperation between Hong Kong and other Asia-Pacific countries constitute this Centre's main interest and the thrust of our investigation. Major research topics include the Hong Kong economy and its transformation; government policies; the economic integration of Greater China; and trade, investment, and financial relations between Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region.

Asian Economic Journal

This is the 24th year in which our Centre has jointly published the Asian Economic Journal for the East Asian Economic Association with our partner in Japan. The ISI has accepted the Journal for coverage, beginning in April/May 2008 with the first 2007 issue. Prof. Liu Pak-wai, Prof. Sung Yun-wing, and Prof. Kwong Kai-sun are serving respectively as Vice President, Director, and Secretary General of the Association. Prof. Du Julan has served as Managing Editor of the journal since 2009.

Asian Economic Journal is a journal that is devoted to publishing articles on the Asian economies which is based in the Asian region. The Journal bears the name of CUHK together with The International Centre for the Study of East Asian Development on the front cover as the two institutions which produce the journal. The Secretariat of the East Asian Economic Association is also located at CUHK using HKIAPS as its address. The journal and the location of the Secretariat have promoted the image of CUHK in general, and HKIAPS in particular as institutions active in research within the Asia-Pacific region.

HKSAR Constitutional Reform Proposal

In response to the consultation of the HKSAR government on the election of the Chief Executive by universal suffrage in 2017, three members of the ERC, namely, Professors Liu Pak-wai and Sung Yun-Wing and Dr. Law Cheung Kwok, have joined a group of 13 economists and social scientists to work out a proposal (popularly known as 13-scholars Proposal). The Proposal was popularized through press conferences, numerous media interviews, and newspaper articles. The Proposal has generated a lot of attention in the community. We also met major political parties, civic groups, and officials of the HKSAR and the Central Governments for exchange of views and to explain our Proposal. The consultation group of the government headed by Ms. Carrie Lam was highly interested and met our group three times in 2013-14 for discussion. We will continue to discuss and liaise with political parties and the HKSAR government in 2014-15 on the Proposal.

International Conference on "Gender and Migration: Changes and Challenges," 2013



The international conference on "Gender and Migration: Changes and Challenges" was one of the tripartite events jointly organized by the Chinese University of Hong Kong, Peking University and Keimvung University in 2013. It was hosted by Gender Research Centre and Gender Studies Programme between 10th and 12th December 2013 at Yasumoto International Academic Park, CUHK.

The conference was honored by the contribution of two prominent scholars who served as the keynote speakers: Prof. C. Cindy Fan, University of California, Los Angeles and Prof. Pierrette Hondagneu-Sotelo, University of Southern California. The titles of their respective speeches were: "Home and Away: Gender and Rural-urban Migration in China" and "Gender and Migration: Legacies and Challenges".

Over 130 participants attended the conference and around 50 papers were presented from scholars of all over the world - China, Korea, Japan, Taiwan, Indonesia, Bangladesh, US, UK, Australia, The Netherlands, Canada, Greece, Israel etc. The discussion was trans-disciplinary and had reviewed many challenges and opportunities related to gender and migration.

A working meeting between GRC and the Chinese Society for Women's Studies (CSWS) was held on December 12, 2013. Prof. Ellen Judd, University of Manitoba, Canada and Prof. Bao Jiewen. University of Nevada met with GRC ExCo members to exchange views and discuss on plans of collaboration between the Centre and the CSWS network of women's studies scholars.



Annual Workshop

Annual Gender Role Workshop 2014



The Annual Gender Role Workshop 2014 was held on 14 June. The topic this year was "Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity and Intersex Status: Different Views and Understandings" (性傾向、性別認同及雙性人身份:點·線·面).In response to the late heated debate on issues affecting sexual minorities - Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Intersex, covering aspects of religion, morality, law, human rights, medical science, culture, employment, and other subjects, the Workshop invited nine guest speakers from different areas of expertise to share their views.

The first part of the workshop included speeches by Dr. York Chow Yat-ngok, Chairperson of Equal Opportunities Resource Centre; Mr. Paul Choi, Executive Director at Goldman Sachs & Co.; Mr. Poon Yu-hin, Research Assistant, Commission; Professor Suen Yiu-tung, Assistant Professor, Dept. of Sociology, CUHK; Ms. Liu Pui-shan, Acting Supervisor of Tung Wah Group of Hospitals CEASE Crisis Centre; and Mr. Ip Shun-tak, Principal of Church of Christ in China Mong Man Wai College. A panel discussion followed with speakers including Ms. Joanne Leung, Chairperson of Transgender Faculty of Education, CUHK; and Ms. Small Luk, an activist for the concerns of intersex status. About 100 people took part in the workshop, including students, faculty, NGO staff and parents. The workshop provided a much needed platform for the expression of different views toward the issues concerning the sexual minority.

Similar to many universities around the world, women researchers, especially in senior positions, are underrepresented in Hong Kong universities. In order to capture the missing talents in women researchers, the University is challenged to build up a supportive environment for women in respect to their specific needs. A panel of senior female professors was invited to share their experience of interfacing their work and family lives while excelling in research. A task force was set up to follow up on the issues raised after the gathering.

Three guest speakers, Prof. Lynette Chua, Assistant Professor, Faculty of Law, National University of Singapore; Prof. Suen Yiu Tung, Assistant Professor, Department of Sociology, ExCo Member, Gender Research Centre, CUHK; and Mr. Verdy Leung, Lecturer, Gender Studies Programme, CUHK, shared their observations on Singapore and Hong Kong's gay and lesbian movement and explicated on the complexity of the role of law and meanings of rights. Around 20 participants joined this seminar.

The second roundtable seminar attracted 25 participants from concerned groups and stakeholders of the LGBTI legislation debate. Prof Stephen Whittle, Professor of Equalities Law, The School of Law, Manchester Metropolitan University, who was the first trans person, and non-physician to become President of the World Professional Association for Transgender Health in 2007, gave an inspiring speech on gender recognition legislation development in UK.

In the face of the extreme difficult and divisive opinions when the legislation process was undergoing in the UK, this seminar looked at 'where we gave in', 'where we fought back' and 'where we won' the arguments, to ultimately create a fair, and ground breaking piece of legislation for the legal recognition of the trans people.



Executive Summary

This is the 7th year since the International Relations Research Programme was established in 2008, which was renamed International Affairs Research Centre (IARC) by the University in summer 2012 within the framework of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (HKIAPS). The IARC conducted high-standard research projects, organized or co-organized major academic events in 2013-14 covering topics including politics, finance, international affairs, such as national education in Hong Kong, Japan in Chinese Junior High School History Textbooks, triangular relationship among U.S., China and India in the Indian Ocean, Sino-Pacific relations, sustainable transport in Europe and globally, Arab Spring and changing Palestinian politics, opportunities and challenges for Dubai and Hong Kong, national development banks and their role in global finance, Sino-Indian relations. We have succeeded in obtaining external donations and research funding, while extending partnership relationship on campus, with other universities and research institutions around the world.

Objectives

IARC is an interdisciplinary research organization, bringing together academic and professional resources regardless of traditional faculty boundaries. The Centre supports research and related activities, including seminars, conferences, publications, collaborative projects as well as some teaching and exchange activities regarding international affairs broadly defined

The Centre is established to play a leading role in international relations and globalization research, particularly in the Asia-Pacific region. Besides academic research, it also provides community service and governmental consultation in order to facilitate decision-making and policy-setting, thereby contributing to public interests at large. Given its international orientation, IARC focuses on global policy studies, including key bilateral relations in the Asia-Pacific, Hong Kong's external relations, nationalism, geopolitics, global media, transnational civil society, and so on. Research in each of these areas is carried forward with guidance from internationally renowned scholars. More research initiatives will be added as the Centre grows.

Research Activities

Throughout the year of 2013-2014, the Centre has hosted

or co-organized three international conferences, three public lectures and three seminars in fostering academic interactions among local and international scholars.

This twoday closed-door conference brought together practitioners and academics from the fields of sustainability, national banking, regional financial and economic development to discuss the role of national development banks in global economy. This seminar was held on CUHK campus during 21 and 22 October 2013.

IARC International Academic Conference & SingPeace Forum 2013 "China and India: Splash of Civilizations" (28-29 Sep 2013)

After two top-notch déroulements in Singapore, this conference was co-hosted by IARC and SingPeace Culture Hong Kong Ltd. as the third SingPeace Forum at Cho Yiu Conference Hall on 28 September 2013. During the past two decades, bilateral commercial relations have increased to record levels, people-to-people interactions have grown significantly. Nevertheless, reports of border incursions, leading-power aspiration have created sometimes extreme nationalist sentiments in both China and India. With this background, "China and India: Splash of Civilizations" invited experts and academics to share valuable insights on topics related to the current situational changes.

Public Lectures

"Sustainable Transport for Sustainable Cities in Europe and Globally" (16 Jan 2014)

Prof. David BANISTER, Professor of Transport Studies at Oxford University, and Director of the Transport Studies Unit, gave a public lecture on 16 January 2014 hosted by IARC. This lecture presented an alternative option, rather than the deteriorating situation with little effective action, that encourage shorter journeys, greater use of green modes of transport, and the innovative development of technology.

"The Arab Spring and Changing Palestinian Politics" (09 Jan 2014)

The presentation of Prof. Ghada ALMADBOUH from Birzeit Universay accounted for the new developments in the Arab world and the rise of political Islam in Egypt and Tunisa, analyzed how such developments affected mobilization, or lack thereof, in the Palestinian Occupied Territory. It also deepened into the Palestinian politics to explain how new trends of neo-liberalism in the Arab world and more recently in the West Bank intermingled with resistance ideas and revolutionary thinking. This lecture was co-organized by Department of Government and Public Administration and IARC on 09 January 2014.

"Dubai and Hong Kong: Two Powerful City States in the Global Economy - Opportunities and Challenges" (23 Oct 2013)

This public lecture was co-organized by IARC, Wu Yee Sun College, Global Studies Programme, and Master of Global Political Economy Programme, at LT8 Cheng Yu Tung Building on 23 October 2013. Prof. Mr. Mhamed BIYAUTANE from Mohamed Bin Rashid School of Government compared the developmental trajectories of Hong Kong and Dubai, illustrated the commonalities between them and traced their success stories. The challenges that these two city states face in the current fluctuating global economic and political stages were discussed in detail.

This lecture was co-organized by IARC, Universities Service Centre for China Studies, Global Studies Programme, and Wu Yee Sun College at LT4 of Cheng Yu Tung Building on 25 April 2014.

Objectives

The Public Policy Research Centre (PPRC) was established in 2005. The Centre is an interdisciplinary research unit under the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies of The Chinese University of Hong Kong. Working closely with the Social Science Faculty of the University, and also other faculties, centres and institutes at The Chinese University, the PPRC strives to promote public policy research on Hong Kong, the Pearl River Delta and also the Asia-Pacific region in general.

To achieve this mission, the Centre strives to:

- Undertake basic and applied social science research on significant public policy issues;
- Provide a platform for supporting and stimulating faculty members to carry out public policy research;
- Offer a venue for faculty members interested in public policy research to exchange ideas and findings;
- Disseminate widely the findings to the general public and scholarly community and raise public awareness of policy issues;
- Act as a bridge between the University and the wider community in the understanding and deliberation of policy issues.

From 2011 onwards, the Centre has been recognizing the importance of raising the awareness and knowledge of the younger generation on policy issues. Since then, the Centre has begun to work closely with various sectors of the wider community, including but not limited to secondary schools and post-secondary education institutions, to research in youth transitions. The Centre expects to bring social scientific policy research to bear on relevant policy making processes, with emphasis on education, youth, and their transition from school to work.

New Research Programme

Population Policy Research Programme

The Government launched a public engagement exercise

on population policy in October 2013 so as to solicit views from the Hong Kong community on population policy issues. The consultation document analyses the challenges brought about by the ageing population and declining workforce in regard to future social and economic development. It also puts forward policy directions for deliberations so as to enable the community to engage in discussions on several important topics.

In January 2014, Professor Joseph Sung, the Vice-Chancellor, called a meeting to push for university-wide concerted efforts to deepen our understanding on population policy in Hong Kong and to respond effective to the government's population policy initiatives. In a subsequent meeting on February 28 chaired by Professor Fanny Cheung, the Pro-Vice-Chancellor, participants resolved to set up a Population Policy Research Programme (PPRP) under the HKIAPS Public Policy Research Center as a platform of coordination. Basic logistic support will be provided by the Public Policy Research Centre.

The objectives for the establishment of the PPRP are:

- 1. To forge a platform for communication among researchers from different disciplines and units at CUHK interested in public policies pertaining to population issues in Hong Kong.
- 2. To provide a focal point for organizational units at CUHK to work together on population policies.
- 3. To offer a conduit for the pooling together of internal resources and channeling of outside funding to the cause of population policy research.
- 4. To present and disseminate CUHK's various research endeavours in a coherent and concerted public image to the community.
- 5. To take initiatives, if necessary and appropriate, on specific research projects on population policies.

Three intersecting themes, each to be championed by a coordinator or coordinators for the respective group of researchers and units interested in pushing forward on each front:

Demography, Migration and Social Integration

The cluster plans to organize a lecture series for colleagues to share their recent research findings and conferences to generate discussions on migration. Prof. Eric Fong of Sociology shall coordinate this cluster.

"Re-Industrializing Chinese Movie Value Chain: State, Market, Culture, and Regional Integration since China's **Economic Reform**"

"Transitioning to Post-secondary Education or Work? A Two-Wave Panel Study of Effects of Career Orientation, Parental Alignment and Social Strain on

Hong Kong's Senior High School Students"

This project is funded by Public Policy Research Fund, Research Grants Council of Hong Kong, and the Central Policy Unit, Hong Kong SAR Government. This is a threeyear project from October 2012 to September 2015. The baseline school survey commenced in Spring 2013 and was completed in August 2013. The survey for followstudy will be pilot-tested in September 2014.

"Patriotic Cultural Organizations in Postwar Hong Kong: Case Studies in Sports, Literature and Music"

This project was funded by the South China Programme of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, CUHK, and already completed in 2014. The project is part of a larger project devoted to studying the history of left-wing organizations in Hong Kong collaborated by Professors Stephen Wing-kai Chiu, Tai-lok Lui of Sociology at the University of Hong Kong, and Sai-sing Yung of Chinese Studies at the National University of Singapore. The larger project has published an edited volume in July 2014 by Oxford University Press (China) (in Chinese, title "胸懷祖國:香港「愛國左派」運動").

"A Study on Mainland Students' Adjustment in Hong Kong"

This project was commissioned by the Central Policy Unit (CPU), Hong

Kong SAR Government. The study aims at investigating how well Mainland students adjust to lives in Hong Kong campus, how to better integrate them both on campus and in Hong Kong society, and how to retain them in Hong Kong after they graduate from universities. The projected is completed, and the final report is submitted. The PI and other collaborators have also published the findings in Hong Kong and Macao Journal.

"Social Attitudes of the Youth Population in Hong Kong: A Follow-up Study "

This project is commissioned by the Central Policy Unit (CPU). This is a follow-up to the 2010 research. The idea is to gauge to what extent social and political attitudes of young people in Hong Kong have changed over the past several years and the reasons why. Data collection was finished in June 2014, and report write-up is in progress.

"The Determinants of Women Labor Force Participation in Hong Kong: 1991-2011"

Professional Development Programme for Curriculum Planning and Teaching of Independent Enquiry Study of **Liberal Studies (S4-6)**

The project is commissioned by the Education Bureau of the Hong Kong SAR Government. It consists of two key components: (1) teacher training events for in-service secondary school teachers; and (2) on-site school-based consultancy services for curriculum design and assessment plans for IES. Both components focus on the curriculum planning and teaching for Independent Enquiry Study (IES) in the syllabus of New Senior Secondary Liberal Studies. The events and activities are expected to be held between

February 2014 and December 2015.

This is a seguel to a previous 24-month project also funded by the Education Bureau of the Hong Kong SAR Government. The repetitive funding support from the Education Bureau witnesses the appreciation of quality delivery and output of PPRC.

Objectives

The research programme is focused on urban and regional development in the Asia-Pacific region especially China. This programme has undertaken research on world cities, globalization, Chinese urbanization and urban and regional development in China covering Pearl River Delta (PRD), Pan-PRD, Guangdong, Shanghai, Fujian and western region. Ongoing research focuses on two themes. Theme 1: Urban and regional development in Hong Kong and Pan-PRD will examine the inter-city relations between Hong Kong and Shenzhen, Hong Kong-Shenzhen metropolis in the context of PRD and Pan-PRD, as well as dramatic urban, socio-economic and environmental transformations in PRD and Pan-PRD region. Theme 2: Population change and urbanization in China will examine inter-city and inter-provincial migration, urbanization and urban development in China. The research programme was officially renamed as the Research Centre for Urban and Regional Development on 1 March 2013.

RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

Chinese Law Programme

Director: Prof. XI Chao

Description

The Chinese Law Programme, through a wide range of academic activities, aspires to become an academically reputed research programme on Chinese law and legal institutions in the Asia Pacific region, serving as an intellectual platform for understanding and exchange of knowledge of Chinese law and legal institutions. Its research activities focus on the interface between the legal system in China and its wider social, economic and political contexts, with special interest in interdisciplinary approaches to law.

Conferences/Roundtables

Roundtable on "Access to Justice through a Class Actions Regime and ADR"

This conference was co-organized by the Chinese Law Programme of HKIAPS and the Centre for Rights and Justice, CUHK Faculty of Law. It was held on October 9, 2013.

The conference brought together academics, senior of members the legal profession in Hong Kong, and senior Hong Kong Government counsels to discuss the highly topical issue of class actions



from a comparative perspective.In particular, the Roundtable critically reviewed the EU policy debates on class action, as well as on various options for mass redress and regulatory control of behavior. The implications of the EU experience for Hong Kong and Mainland China were intensively discussed.

Public Lectures and Seminars

1. "Administrative Law in China: Law and Practice"

by Justice Wang Xujun (Chief Justice of the Administrative Division, Higher People's Court of the Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region), October 2, 2013.

Judicial review of administrative acts is a central feature of modern legal systems. China enacted the Administrative Litigation Law in 1989, creating an administrative law regime with the court playing a central role in reviewing the legality of certain types of administrative acts. Drawing upon his rich and profound experience as an administrative judge in Inner Mongolia, Judge Wang's public lecture will shed light on the genius of Chinese administrative law: its key principles, doctrines and procedures, its actual operation and functioning, as well as its opportunities and challenges ahead.

2. "Class Actions, Regulation and ADR: The EU Model, and Implications for Hong Kong and Mainland China"

by Professor Christopher Hodges (Head of the CMS/ Swiss Re Research Programme on Civil Justice Systems, Centre for Socio-Legal Studies, University of Oxford), on October 8, 2013.

The European Commission published its ecommendation on Collective Redress in June 2013 after several years of debate. 18 Member States



currently have class action procedures, but they vary enormously in design and scope. Most are very little used. The EU debate has focused on avoiding the "toxic cocktail" of U.S.-style class actions, and the Commission has proposed a list of safeguards against abuse. The result is that class actions will not be a principal tool in delivering mass redress, since financial incentives are limited and various controls make them slow, expensive and unattractive. Instead, innovative regulatory and ADR mechanisms are emerging as the first line in delivering both compensation and behavior control. The implications of these new policy directions are not widely known, and should be of great interest for policy debates on the future of class actions and regulation in Hong Kong and China. Hong Kong and China.

"China in a Globalised World of Business, Human 3. Rightsand the Rule of Law: The Problem of Corporate Limited Liability"

by Dr Dan Plesch (Director of the Centre for International Studies and Diplomacy at SOAS, University of London), on March 3, 2014.

China has enthusiastically adopted large parts of the Anglo-American Corporate structure while at the same time seeking to end for ever the century of humiliation at the hands of outside powers. It is poorly understood that this corporate structure carries with it the impunity of owners of capital to legal redress from people whose property they may injur, and that this structure, now nearly universal was pioneered in a colonial context. As an issue of political philosophy and practical life as well as law the question arises whether Limited Liability is a bitter pill encased in an attractive coating. Limited Liability breaches the fundamental principles in free societies that all shall be equal in law and that the law shall protect property rights. Limited Liability abolishes the right of creditors to seek redress in law from the owners (shareholders) of companies and in so doing damages their property rights. These principles are enshrined in numerous statutes, constitutions and declarations of the international community, notably Articles I and XVII of the UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Historically Limited Liability was opposed on these grounds by Adam Smith amongst many others. In the post-WW2 era of a mixed economy and a strong role for state regulation the issue of Limited Liability lost its relevance. Today after some 30 years of pressure to remove what is called regulatory interference with the market it is time to bring into the debate the most important government regulation that interferes with the market: corporate limited liability.

"The Failure of Corporate Internal Information Sharing and Internal Controls: Case Studies in Taiwan"

by Professor Chang-hsien TSAI (Associate Professor of Law, National Tsing Hua University), on April 11, 2014.

Effective corporate internal controls and internal audits have long been the key elements of corporate governance. This lecture would take a look at failure of internal controls from Japanese to Taiwanese cases, and seek to resolve Taiwan's failures in particular. Although Japan and Taiwan have similarly been adopting U.S. independent directors and audit committees during recent years, we could find that common issues in those East Asian cases are the dysfunctional internal information sharing mechanism in particular and failure of internal controls in general. In Taiwan, in order to prevent internal illegal activities or managerial misconduct, independent directors are viewed as a magic bullet in corporate governance for Taiwan's

government. For instance, the Financial Supervisory Commission (FSC), Taiwan's financial market watchdog, recently announced that all publicly listed companies would be required to have independent directors before 2017. Moreover, an enlarged group of listed companies must establish audit committees, substituting for traditional company auditors (or Kansayaku in Japanese) by 2019. To accommodate Taiwan's reform trend towards adoption of independent directors and audit committees, this lecture would suggest a complementary regulatory framework.

The research aims to (1) explore and monitor the recent changes of cross-border drug use in Hong Kong; (2) evaluate the current cross-border drug policies through both qualitative and quantitative methods; (3) produce an integrated archival database with the function of automatic searching and updating so that we could closely monitor the most recent changes of cross-border substance use from media, official departments, academia, NGOs and other relevant websites.

 "Conformists or Deviants?--- The Behavior and Its Underlying Mechanisms of Polluting Firms in the Pearl River Delta"

Objectives

The objective of the Programme is to foster and support academic research on China by providing grants. Through the dissemination of research findings, the Programme helps to provide useful references for the formulation of public policies.

Regionally, the grants now cover studies on Hong Kong, mainland China, and the area's interrelated development with Macao, Taiwan, and other parts of the world. Individual research, interdisciplinary collaboration, and research partnerships across and outside of the Asia-Pacific region are also equally considered.

The Programme is not limited to funding projects of any particular disciplines or topics, innovative research with relevance to China is all welcome. The current research areas supported include:

- 1. development of the mainland China-Hong Kong nexus;
- interrelations among state-building efforts, culture, and local society;
- 3. institutional evolution and transformation;
- 4. growth and disparities in regional development; and
- 5. external relations.

Management Committee

Research Activities

In March 2011, a longitudinal programme was set up to develop a series of comprehensive and multi-dimensional dataset on the culture of Hong Kong over a span of 6 years from 2011 to 2017. This programme has 4 theme-correlated projects and will hold a series of biennial symposium to disseminate the research findings.

Same as last year, the Programme held two rounds of grant awards. Five research projects were supported as detailed in the list of newly funded projects below. The number of ongoing projects has accumulated to six, and twelve other projects were completed in the reporting year.

Newly Funded Projects

Five projects were supported between August 2013 and July 2014.

 "A Pilot Study on Prevalence and Associates of Cyber Bullying in Taiwan, Hong Kong and Mainland China"

Conducted by Prof. Chen Ji-kang (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Wei His-sheng (Department of Social Work, National Taipei University, Taiwan) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$137,000 was awarded in 2013.

This project aims to address four goals: 1) explore the prevalence of specific forms of perpetration and victimization of cyber bullying as well as how students demographic variables (gender and grade level) relate to perpetration and victimization of cyber bullying. 2) explore how students' personal, family, school and community experience associated with cyber bullying in three Chinese societies. 3) examine similarities and differences in prevalence and risk factors of cyber bullying among these Chinese societies. 4) explore how

western risks factors of cyber bullying apply to Chinese culture contexts.

2. "Happiness and Socioeconomic Inequality within Marriage: Experimental Survey Evidence from the Pearl River Delta"

Conducted by Prof. Tam Hong-wing (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator. HK\$198,000 was awarded in 2013.

This research aims to examine whether and how the happiness of an urban Chinese is influenced by socioeconomic inequality within marriage, with inequality defined by the relative standing of income and occupational status between husband and wife. It tests the validity of three existing theories that may explain any inequality effects: (a) conformity to gender ideology, (b) equity and (c) family utility. Mixed methods approach is used. Not only collect attitudinal data on gender imagine, role play, and report their personal sense of overall happiness under different hypothetical combinations of marital inequality. This study is a pioneering effort in Chinese sociology, studying the interplay of social comparison and marriage. It is also timely, as China faces surging economic inequality and a stagnation of national happiness.

"Defining the Relationship between the State and the Market for Effective Pollutant Emission Trading in China"

Conducted by Prof. Xu Yuan (Department of Geography and Resource Management) as principal investigator. HK\$151,080 was awarded in 2014.

This Research aims to evaluate pilot SO2 and CO2 emission trading schemes in China from the market design perspective, assess the respective roles of the state and the market, investigate the boundary between them for the market to function well, and discuss how to let the market play a "decisive" role. It will examine the monitoring, reporting and verification (MRV) systems and the effectiveness across various emission source sizes; appraise the impact of emission source sizes on the appropriate boundary between the state and the market.

4. "Between Hui and Islam: Re-invention of City Space in Muslim Women in Guangzhou and Hong Kong"

Conducted by Prof. Wong Wai-ching (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$124,280 was awarded in 2014.

This research aims to address four goals: 1) to study the historical relationship between Muslim communities of Guangzhou and Hong Kong in terms of family, organizational and other social ties; 2) to examine the differences in religious and daily practices in the two Muslim communities of Guangzhou and Hong Kong with respect to their different social and historical

development; 3) to compare and contrast the Islamic teachings on women and women's practice of them in two different cities; and 4) To conceptualize the use of religious and family space in women's negotiation between their different identities of Hui, South Asians and Islam in/outside of their respective Islamic communities.

"The Determinants of Women Labor Force Participation in Hong Kong: 1991-2011"

Conducted by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Prof. Tong Yuying (Department of Sociology) to serve as coinvestigator. HK\$120,000 was awarded in 2014.

This research seeks to address five specific aims: 1) to examine the trends of women labor force participation between ages 25-54 from 1981 to 2011 and compare it with OECD countries. 2) to test the theories of availability, marketability, market demand from the micro level of individuals and households on explaining the status of women labor force participation. 3) to examine the new household economic theory at the micro level by incorporating the earning ability of other family members into the model. 4) to understand the differentials of choices among different types of labor participation such as full-time vs. part-time job. 5) to contribute to the current initiative at CUHK on population policy research by shedding light on a key variable in Hong Kong's human resources development.

Ongoing Projects

Six projects funded by the Programme are on-going. They

1. "A Comparative Study on the Work Experience and Life Adjustment of Migrant Workers in the Eastern and Southern Coastal Areas of Mainland China"

Conducted by Prof. To Siu-ming (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Fang Wei (School of Politics and Public Administration, Zhejiang University of Technology, China), Prof. Tam Hau-lin Cherry (Applied Social Studies, City University of Hong Kong), and Prof. Ngai Sek-yum, Steven (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$122,440 was awarded in 2012.

This project identifies and compares the work experiences and life adjustment of migrant workers living in the eastern coastal areas and southern coastal areas of mainland China. It addresses issues like the way migrant workers perceive their work experience and work adjustment in the host society; similarities or differences between the work experiences and life adjustment of migrant workers living in the eastern coastal areas and those living in the southern coastal areas; and the implications of migrant workers' work experience and life adjustments for policy

formulation, social service development, and future research directions.

2. "Do Population Control Policies Improve Child Education? Evidence from China's One-Child Policy"

Conducted by Prof. Zhang Hongliang (Department of Economics) as principal investigator, with Prof. Zhang Junsen (Department of Economics) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$50,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project brings new empirical evidences to advance the understanding of the quantity-quality trade-off in general and the effect of population control policies on children's human capital investment in particular. It attempts to be the first study to exploit the regional differences in the fertility gaps between mothers of different ages at first birth caused by the differences in the strictness of local fertility control to identify the exogenous variations in family size. By exploring China's unique social experiment of the One-Child Policy, results from this project will be highly relevant for policymakers to evaluate the effects of existing family planning policies as well as construct effective future ones.

"Motivational Experience for Securing a Job: A Study of Unemployed Youth in Hong Kong and Mainland China"

Conducted by Prof. Ngai Sek-yum, Steven (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Cheung Chau-kiu, Jacky (Applied Social Studies, City University of Hong Kong) and Prof. To Siu-ming (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$142,800 was awarded in 2012.

This project verifies the impacts and identifies concrete experiences leading to self-actualization. It is rely on opened-ended interviews and structured questionnaire surveys to elicit needed information. The information will clarify experiential factors that motivate unemployed youth to get jobs. This project would contribute empirical and concrete evidence viable for policy and service implementation.

4. "The Consequences of Migration to Children: A Quantitative Case Study with Comparison Groups at Origins and Destinations"

Conducted by Prof. Tong Yuying (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Prof. Piotrowski Martin (Department of Sociology, University of Oklahoma) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$145,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project conducts a quantitative case study to assess the impacts of parental labour migration on well-being of their children in contemporary china, drawing on a research design that would enable us to address the two longstanding obstacles mentioned above to yield a reliable answer to the central question. It will examine how social context factors, such as family, community and school, enhance or moderate the pathway of parental migration on children well-being.

5. "The Historical and Social Context of Crime Boom (1960-1985) in Hong Kong"

Conducted by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai Stepphen

Conducted by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai, Stenphen (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Prof. Lee King-wa (Department of Sociology) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$64,600 was awarded in 2012.

This project identifies the societal and political mechanisms or processes that triggered such a violent episode within our defined period of study (1960-1985). It looks into the social context to which serious crimes especially homicide incidents took place, and explores the political dynamics and their relation to the issue of crime at the time. It would identify how triad societies adapted as the colonial state increased its penetration effort to the local Chinese community and whether this resulted in changing nature of violence. At least, this project will review the latest criminology literatures to provide an up-to-date theoretical explanation of the phenomenon concerned.

6. "The Patterns and Impacts of Elder Care Arrangements in Shanghai and Hong Kong: Convergence and Divergence"

Conducted by Prof. Zhang Jiaan (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator. HK\$149,500 was rewarded in 2013.

This project describes and compares the current patterns of elder care arrangements in Shanghai and Hong Kong, and examines explanatory mechanisms for differential patterns of elder care arrangements between and within two societies. It evaluates the linkage between differential patterns of elder care arrangement and elders' life satisfaction between and within Hong Kong and Shanghai. This study will join the debate about differential patterns of elder care by providing new evidence from one of the most rapidly aging societies, and enrich the literature on the mechanism for differential patterns of elder care arrangements by examining a comprehensive model that takes into account individual, interpersonal and societal influence on elder care arrangements. The findings from, the project will also extend knowledge of the linkage between elder care patterns and elders' life satisfaction in Chinese societies. The study will also have significant social work and policy implications.

Completed Projects

Twelve projects funded by the Programme were completed in the report period.

1. "Two Countries, One System?: A Comparative Study of the Political Economy of Decentralization in China and Vietnam"

Conducted by Prof. Wong Hok-wui Stan (Department of

Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator. HK\$90,000 was awarded in 2009.

This project studied the effects of decentralization on the political economy and economic development of China and Vietnam by drawing on comparative case studies in selected cities of the two countries.

"An Evaluation of Effects of Parental Absence on Children's Academic Performance and the Relevant Policy Intervention Programs in China"

Conducted by Prof. Zhang Junsen (Department of Economics) as principal investigator, with Prof. Jere R. Behrman (Population Studies Center, University of Pennsylvania), Prof. Simon C. Fan, Prof Wei Xiangdong (Department of Economics, Lingnan University), and Prof. Zhang Hongliang (Department of Economics) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$200,000 was awarded in 2009.

This project provided policy guidance in solving the education difficulties for children of rural migrant workers who have been left behind in their hometown. Sample surveys were conducted in 10 central elementary schools in Longhui County of Hunan. The school performance of the "left-behinds" who lack parental care and a home education environment were compared with that of "left-behinds" who are receiving assistance in a designed intervention programme.

"Patriotic Cultural Organizations in Postwar Hong Kong: Case Studies in Sports, Literature and Music"

Conducted by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai Stephen (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Senior Instructor Cheung Wing-mui (Chinese Language & Literature), PhD Candidate Lee Siu-yan (Department of Music) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$59,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project is part of a larger project entitled "With China in Their Hearts: The History, Transformations and Social Impacts of the Patriotic Movement in Hong Kong", consisting of eight sub-projects aiming to study the history of left-wing organizations in Hong Kong since the conclusion of the Second World War. The study focused on three of the sub-projects on sports, literature and music which are coordinated by CU staff, namely, Happy Valley Athletic Association (偷園體育會), serial novels (連載小說) in the pro-China newspaper Wenweipo, and one of the most active Cantonese opera group (南國 粤劇團). Findings shed important light on the impacts of the "China connection" beyond a number of welltrodden areas of left-wing activities in Hong Kong.

"Transplantation of Model Plays in Cantonese Operas, 1969 to 1975"

Conducted by Prof. Pang Lai-kwan (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$130,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project explored the aesthetic & ideological factors involved in these transplantation projects, and to analyze the negotiations taken place that might reveal a different angle to understand cultural production during the Cultural Revolution. Findings helped to fill up a clear scholarly gap in Cantonese Opera study, where very little has been written about this period.

"Constructing the Chinese model of work in the social work knowledge transfer process between Hong Kong and Shenzhen?"

Conducted by Prof. Leung Tse-fong Terry (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Instructor Tam Hau-lin Cherry (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$180,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project identified the dilemma and struggle the Shenzhen social workers and Hong Kong supervisors have in complying with social work practice codes in the social and political context of China, to explicate how they justify and reason for the social-moral order of social work in China, and the rationalities and underlying values supporting their construction. The study can enable a better understanding of the extent that liberalist tenets in western model of social work influence the new breed of social workers in China.

6. "Rebuilding Post-disaster Community from Inside out: Action Research on an Asset-based Social Recovery Project in Beichuan"

Conducted by Prof. Wong Hung (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Huang Yunong (Social Work Development Research Center, Southwestern University of Finance and Economics, Sichuan, China) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$190,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project conducted an experimental asset-based social recovery project in Beichuan of Sichuan to rebuild social capital from inside out and preserve and revitalize cultural and natural assets of the postdisaster community, and to identify the impacts of the "Asset-Based Community Development" model on the livelihood of the residents in Beichuan. The model served as a demonstration model which included systematically reviewed knowledge, grounded practical experience and critical professional reflection, to other post-disaster projects in China and other developing countries.

"From Doing Good for Fun to Doing Good Professionally: **Exploring the Professionalization Process of Grassroots** Philanthropic Organizations in Southeast China"

Conducted by Prof. Zhou Huiquan (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Xu Ying (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$100,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project studied a snowball sample of southeast China GPOs (Jiangsu, Shanghai, Zhejiang, Fujian and Guangdong) involved in promoting compulsory education in rural China. The findings of the study made significant contributions to the field of nonprofit studies in China. It identified areas needing policy changes, share with the organizations that are struggling to professionalize in order to improve the service quality provided by these organizations.

8. "The Development of Major Mainland Cities and Its Implications to Hong Kong under the 12th FYP of China"

Conducted by Prof. Shen Jianfa (Department of Geography and Resource Management) as principal investigator, with Prof. Sung Yun-wing (Department of Economics), Prof. Xu Jiang (Department of Geography and Resource Management), and Prof. Wang Guixin (Research Center for Urban and Regional Development, Fudan University) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$180,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project assessed the effectiveness of FYP in major Chinese cities and how the state-led planning system fits into Hong Kong's planning and policy making, to examine the development, strategy and polices of four leading mainland cities (Shanghai, Nanjing, Guangzhou and Shenzhen), and to reveal the mechanism of the formulation of urban strategies and the process of intercity competition. Findings contributed to academic debates and conceptualization of three interrelated issues, namely the role of state planning in economic development in socialist China, the relation between state and market in capitalist Hong Kong, and inter-city competition and urban competitiveness.

 "Political Attitude of Hong Kong People and Governance of Hong Kong: A Comparison with Other Asian Regions through the Asian Barometer Survey"

Conducted by Prof. Ma Ngok (Department of Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator, with Prof. Wong Hok-wui (Department of Government and Public Administration), Prof. Lam Wai-man (Department of Politics and Public Administration, HKU), and Prof. Chan Kin-man (Department of Sociology) to serve as coinvestigators. HK\$68,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project aimed to examine the change in political values longitudinally in Hong Kong, in particular the relationship between regime evaluation and democratic values, in order to bring very meaningful comparison with cross-national data in other Asian polities. Findings shed important light on the relationship between the "democratic deficit" and the current governance problems of Hong Kong, and how to develop democratic

values that are beneficial to the political transition to full democracy and the subsequent democratic consolidation of the regime.

10. "西方宗教傳入華南鄉村社會研究:以天主教為例證"

Conducted by Dr. Patrick Taveirne (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator, with Dr. Ha Keloon (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$78,000 was awarded in 2012.

本研究在學術與社會發展方面均極具意義。透過天主教進入中國鄉村所引發的"涵化作用"(Acculturation),瞭解天主教信仰在底層社會的發展處境,探尋族群或地域的文化個性,促進東西方文明進一步交流與對話。從研究天主教與中國鄉村傳統文化的關係中,有助推動今天的中國天主教會和諧發展,亦有著現實指導的意義。

11. "Miss Etiquette: Hyper-femininities and Nation making in Guangzhou"

Conducted by Prof. Wu Ka-ming (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$50,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project examined the phenomenon of and the discourse on the Miss Etiquettes, specifically in one of the major Chinese national events, the Guangzhou Asia Games in 2010, and to study how the Chinese society in the southern cosmopolitan actively responds, contests and negotiates with the official state construction of the national subject in the era of a rising China. Findings contributed significantly to the existing scholarship on gender, nation-building, state-society relations, cultural identity and performance.

12. "The Historical and Social Context of Crime Boom (1960-1985) in Hong Kong"

Conducted by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai, Stenphen (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Prof. Lee Kingwa (Department of Sociology) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$64,600 was awarded in 2012.

This project identified the societal and political mechanisms or processes that triggered such a violent episode within our defined period of study (1960-1985). It looked into the social context to which serious crimes especially homicide incidents took place, and explores the political dynamics and their relation to the issue of crime at the time. It also identified how triad societies adapted as the colonial state increased its penetration effort to the local Chinese community and whether this resulted in changing nature of violence. At least, this project reviewed the latest criminology literatures to provide an up-to-date theoretical explanation of the phenomenon concerned.

Archive on Folk History in China

Since 2006, there has been an annual allocation from the Programme towards the building of an archive and a website (http://mjlsh.usc.cuhk.edu.hk) on the folk history of the people of China. The project is overseen by the Universities Service Centre for China Studies at CUHK. A three-year progress report was submitted to the Programme in June 2012.

The archive is a depository for memoirs and non-fiction writings by common citizens in mainland China. The website is a window through which the collection can be made accessible to the general public and memoir-writers, and to arouse the interest of the public in writing about their personal experiences with China's changing society.

Telephone Survey Research Laboratory

Coordinator: Dr. ZHENG Wan-tai, Victor

Established in May 1995, the Laboratory now can handle 56 telephone lines, all connected to the CATI (Computer Assisted Telephone Interview) system operated through a main server. It can cope with the demands of large samples under time constraint.

Objectives

- 1. To provide a telephone survey laboratory to researchers at the Chinese University who want to use a telephone interview technique to facilitate their research.
- 2. To enable the development of new research interests using the telephone interview method.
- To collect panel public opinion data of academic and social value.
- To serve as a link between the Chinese University and the public by regularly offering results of survey polls on public issues.

Accomplishments

Over 1,120 commissioned surveys have been completed since the establishment of the Laboratory (about 50 surveys in the past year). Our survey findings have been widely covered by the media, thereby helping to raise the profile of the Institute and the Chinese University.

The Laboratory has attracted an increasing number of researchers from academic circles and the media who want to use telephone survey as an alternative method of data collection.

With the improving financial situation, we have designed and launched our panel surveys for academic research.

Now the Laboratory has 60 interviewing stations and we have trained and pooled over 200 experienced interviewers from amongst CUHK students as well as students from other universities, providing them with not only a good source of income but also the valuable experience of conducting telephone survey research.

Policy

The Laboratory welcomes the sponsorship or commission of surveys; it is also open to collaboration with interested persons or organizations.

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
